Mather Establishes State's First Accredited Graduate Nurse Residency Program

New graduate nurses at Mather will be mentored and developed over the course of their first year on the job through our new Graduate Nurse Transition to Practice Residency Program. The program, which is accredited by the American Nurses Credentialing Center, is the first of its kind in New York State.

"Achieving accreditation for a graduate nurse program demonstrates the value that nursing has within an organization," said Brandy L. Feliu, MSN, RN, Assistant Vice President for Nursing Professional Development. "At Mather we focus on the lifelong learning process of our nurses. We involve them in educational activities that develop and maintain their competence and performance. These

continued activities have a positive impact on the ability of our nurses to deliver high quality and safe patient care in all practice settings and environments."

Nursing research studies have shown that nurse residency programs increase the retention and satisfaction of new graduate nurses. The program helps to bridge the gap between theory and practice, supporting the new graduate nurses in patient care. Nurse residency programs are recommended by the American Association of Colleges of Nursing; the Institute of Medicine report: The Future of Nursing published in 2010; and the American Nurses Association through the Practice Transition Accreditation Program.

President's Column

Our vision at Mather is to become the best community teaching hospital in New York State. One of the ways that will help us achieve this goal is by creating a "just culture" - which is a characteristic of any high reliability organization. A just culture balances the need for open and honest reporting with the goal of a quality learning environment that is constantly improving and is obsessed with safety. This is done by empowering every physician, employee, and volunteer to speak up when they think something could be

harmful to patients, visitors or staff. A just culture examines the process and uncovers where improvements should be made, ideally before a negative event occurs.

In a just culture, leadership and frontline staff share accountability for safety. Staff is responsible for recognizing and reporting errors and error-prone systems and openly discussing them with managers and peers. Leaders are charged with creating an environment where staff is always comfortable disclosing actual and potential errors. Leaders ensure that reporting won't place the reporter at risk for punishment. Staff concerns are heard and real action is taken when necessary in a timely manner.

While Mather has been recognized for patient safety from organizations such as The Leapfrog Group, we must continually be working to improve on our processes. In the coming months, you will learn more about becoming much more of a high reliable organization and developing a strong just culture at Mather Hospital.

Project ACHIEVE Aims to Improve Care Transitions for Patients, Families

Mather was a patient recruitment site for Project ACHIEVE (Achieving Patient-Centered Care and Optimized Health In Care Transitions by Evaluating the Value of Evidence), a

five-year \$15 million study aimed at understanding what matters most to patients and caregivers during the transition from hospital to home and how hospitals can improve this care transition. The study was funded by the Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI). When completed by 2019, it will develop best-practice recommendations for patient-centered care strategies that hospitals can implement to improve the hospital discharge process.

Despite the intensity of efforts launched in the past decade to understand how to reduce unnecessary healthcare utilization, reduce hospital readmissions and improve patient experience, patients and their family members still experience less than optimal transitions from hospital to home (i.e., care transitions).

In order to improve patient and family caregiver experiences and outcomes associated with care transitions, Project ACHIEVE comprehensively analyzed this process at more than 40 hospital sites nationwide. At Mather Hospital, Lorraine Farrell, AVP Medical Affairs and Richard Daly, NP Hospital Medicine worked together to launch the project and identify patients, as well as caregivers, who were eligible for the study.

"Participation in the ACHIEVE project will help staff at Mather to learn what matters most to patients and caregivers regarding care transitions (hospital to home and hospital to skilled nursing facility)," Farrell said. "This is the first research study of its kind and although various strategies are used by staff to smooth these transitions, we do not know which strategies are most effective. Knowledge of effective strategies allows Mather staff to improve discharge planning processes that may reduce readmission rates and improve patient satisfaction with care."





Mather Earns National Stroke Patient Care Awards

In recognition of its quality care for stroke patients, Mather Hospital received the 2018 American Heart Association/ American Stroke Association's Get With The Guidelines®-Stroke Gold Plus Quality Achievement Award. The award recognizes the hospital's commitment to ensuring stroke patients receive the most appropriate treatment according to nationally recognized, research-based guidelines based on the latest scientific evidence.

JD from the University of Virginia. He was admitted to the Ohio state bar in 1978 and practiced law there until 1983.

Mather earned the award by meeting specific quality achievement measures for the diagnosis and treatment of stroke patients. These measures include evaluation of the proper use of medications and other stroke treatments aligned with the most up-to-date, evidence-based guidelines with the goal of speeding recovery and reducing death and disability for stroke patients. Before discharge, patients also receive education on managing their health, get a follow-up visit scheduled, as well as other care transition interventions.

Mather also received the Target: StrokeSM Elite award, given to hospitals that meet quality measures developed to reduce the time between the patient's arrival at the hospital and treatment with the clot-buster tissue plasminogen activator (tPA), the only drug approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to treat ischemic stroke.


